

2024's Most Cited Article in Aesthetic Plastic Surgery Journal:

Performance of ChatGPT in Answering Clinical Questions on the Practical Guideline of Blepharoptosis

ISAPS: Congratulations on having the most cited article in the Aesthetic Plastic Surgery Journal last year! What does it mean for you to receive this award? SHIRAISHI: Thank you so much—I'm truly honored by this recognition. You know, when you're deep in research, you sometimes wonder if your work will make a real difference. To see that this study has resonated with colleagues around the world and has been cited so extensively... It's incredibly validating. But more than personal satisfaction, what excites me most is knowing that this research is actually influencing how other surgeons approach their work. That's the real reward—when your findings help advance the field globally. It definitely motivates me to keep pushing the boundaries of what we can achieve through rigorous research.

ISAPS: In today's work environment, what level of impact does artificial intelligence have on aesthetic plastic surgery, and how do you think it could influence surgeons and patients in the next five years? SHIRAISHI: It's fascinating, really. We're already observing AI make significant inroads in several areas—preoperative simulation is becoming incredibly sophisticated, our image analysis capabilities have improved dramatically, and surgical planning is more precise than ever before. But I think we're just scratching the surface.

Looking ahead five years, I expect we'll see revolutionary advances in predictive modeling—being able to tell patients with much greater accuracy what their results will look like. We're also moving toward truly individualized treatment plans, where AI helps us tailor every aspect of surgery to the specific patient. For our patients, this translates to safer procedures and more predictable, satisfying results.

As surgeons, AI is becoming an invaluable tool that allows us to work more efficiently while maintaining—or even improving—precision. But here's what really excites me: generative AI. It's the most versatile and powerful development we're seeing, with enormous potential we're only beginning to understand.

That said, I think it's crucial that we remain realistic about the current limitations. We need to be transparent with patients about what generative AI can and cannot do and address the risks they might face when using these tools independently. My goal is to help our field navigate this evolution thoughtfully—embracing the benefits while being honest about the challenges.

ISAPS: You will receive the award at the ISAPS Olympiad World Congress Awards Ceremony. What makes the ISAPS Congress unique, and what would you tell someone why it is so important to attend? SHIRAISHI: I think that there's really nothing quite like it. The ISAPS Congress brings together the absolute best minds in aesthetic plastic surgery from every corner of the globe. It's not just another conference—it's where the future of our field gets shaped.

What makes it unique is the caliber of the presentations and the depth of knowledge sharing. You're getting the latest technological breakthroughs, cutting-edge research findings, and practical insights that you simply can't find anywhere else. But beyond the formal sessions, the networking opportunities are invaluable. The connections you make—with established leaders and rising stars alike—often lead to collaborations that last for years.

For any aesthetic plastic surgeon serious about staying at the forefront of the field, this isn't optional; it's essential. You walk away with knowledge that directly improves your techniques and ultimately benefits your patients. I actually encourage my colleagues back home to participate more actively. The global perspective you gain is truly transformative.

ISAPS: How has your ISAPS Resident Membership guided your career since joining, and what does being part of the #ISAPSFamily mean for you? SHIRAISHI: The Resident Membership has been absolutely pivotal in my development as a surgeon and researcher. From day one, the resources available—the webinars, access to the Aesthetic Plastic Surgery Journal (APS), the educational content—they've kept me connected to the latest developments in real-time.

But what's been even more valuable is the mentorship and networking opportunities. I've been able to connect with world-renowned surgeons who've become genuine mentors, as well as peers from my generation who are doing incredible work. These relationships have opened doors I never would have imagined.

Looking forward, I'm particularly excited about potentially taking on more responsibility, maybe helping manage webinars, participating in international research collaborations, or contributing more as an Editorial Board Member for APS.

Vertical Superior Vector Suspension of the Anterior Mobile Face with the V Plication Facelift: A Volumization and Lifting Technique

Background

In most of the published plication techniques in face lift surgery, the vectors of plication are not entirely superiorly and vertically directed. The same applies with the deep plane, SMAS elevation techniques in the majority of which the vectors of traction are not superiorly vertically directed. The aging symptoms are mostly prominent at the anterior mobile face due to the gravity effect, and this is the area where attention should be focused to correct these symptoms following a face lift surgery.

Method


We have evaluated the results of 58 patients who underwent the V plication face lift between January 2021 to January 2024 in terms of demographics, procedure, surgical technique, adjuvant treatments, final outcomes and complications.

Result

All 58 patients underwent primary face lift with the V plication for vertical superior traction and suspension of the facial tissues. The average age value was 64 years. Forty-six patients underwent concomitant upper and lower blepharoplasty, and 25 fat transfer of the upper periorbital region. There were one self-resolving neurapraxia of the right buccal branch of facial nerve and three minor self-absorbed localized blood collections.



Reflections from the ISAPS Olympiad World Congress 2025, Singapore

The ISAPS Olympiad 2025 recently wrapped up in Singapore. Renowned for their academic excellence, presentations of new surgical techniques, and the latest technological advancements, these meetings are always impactful. However, there is a less visible but equally powerful value that I had the opportunity to discuss with many attendees: **professional networking is truly transformative**.

Beyond the lecture halls—in the corridors, cafés, social events, and even during chance encounters outside Marina Bay, relationships were formed that will **profoundly impact the professional lives** of the plastic surgeons fortunate enough to attend.

When I reflect on the four days of the Congress, where I had the privilege of participating in the ISAPS National Secretaries Meeting, moderating a session at the Residents' Symposium, joining a Business School panel, and attending other academic and organizational activities, and comparing that with the learning I experienced during social exchanges, coffee breaks, lunch gatherings, the opening reception, and the networking party, I can say the **benefits and learning opportunities were equally valuable**.

The scientific presentations offered groundbreaking theories and invaluable clinical results. Still, it was through informal conversations that we shared what doesn't always make it into publications: how techniques are **adapted to different patient types**, what complications arose and how they **were resolved**, and what subtle elements make a technique **successful in real-life practice**. These insights simply don't fit into formal panels.

Conversations with colleagues from different countries open our eyes to other realities, surgical styles, and ways of managing clinical practices. Many surgeons walk away **not only with scientific growth but with ideas to improve their private practice, innovate in patient care models, or transform the patient experience itself.** Learning how a practice is structured in Dubai, Paris, or São Paulo can be just as enlightening as a technical lecture. I had the chance to speak at length with a colleague from Argentina, and his feedback was one of the highlights of the entire Congress for me.

At events like the ISAPS Olympiad World Congress 2025, **collaborations emerge**, including multicenter research projects, educational initiatives, training program opportunities, planning for future Congresses and upcoming events, and creating fellowships or commercial partnerships with medical companies. The trust built face-to-face is difficult to replicate through any other medium.

Young surgeons find mentors who can **guide them**. Experienced surgeons meet new generations of motivated professionals who **inspire them**. This mutual feedback loop deeply enriches the entire community. Actively participating in these events allows you to position yourself as a thought leader, unlock new speaking opportunities, receive academic invitations, and build a reputation that reaches far beyond your local sphere—**international projection at its finest**.

During the ISAPS Olympiad, there were formal gatherings such as the leadership luncheons, resident meetings, and innovation roundtables. However, some of the most valuable conversations also took place over informal hotel breakfasts, shuttle rides to social events, and walks through the Marina Bay Gardens. All of these settings are equally important. The key is to arrive with an **open mind and a willingness to listen, share, and learn**.

Additionally, the Olympiad format adds an extra **motivational and competitive element** to the presentations. It encourages many of us to submit our work, to research, and to publish. If you are not yet a member of ISAPS and are reading this, let me tell you, participating in these events and connecting with the global surgical community is a powerful reason to join. Being **part of this network connects you with world-class leaders**, gives you **privileged access to continuous education**, and allows you to **grow faster**, **stronger**, and more securely.

In a specialty as demanding as plastic surgery, technical excellence is essential, but sustained growth comes with meaningful human relationships. Networking not only expands our opportunities but also reminds us that we are not alone on this surgical journey.

Singapore was the stage. The global ISAPS community, was the main character. And the most valuable learning came from every genuine conversation we shared.
