Tunc Tiryaki, MD

Chair of the ISAPS Humanitarian

Programs Task Force

Developing the ISAPS Humanitarian Programs Task Force

This month, we connected with the Chair of the Humanitarian Programs Task Force, Tunc Tiryaki, to learn more about ISAPS' Humanitarian Program initiatives.

The ISAPS Humanitarian Task Force was founded in 2012 in collaboration with the United Nations at the Biennial World Congress, organized in Geneva, to increase ISAPS' activity in areas where a humanitarian response was needed, including goals to expand opportunities for educational programs in developing countries.

It is for these reasons that we are developing and progressing our current **Humanitarian Programs Task Force** to develop ISAPS members' missions for future disaster volunteer outreach. By leading these projects, we hope to intensify our Society's impact on global humanitarian affairs.

Leading this initiative is Tunc Tiryaki, who is eager to refine the current **Humanitarian Programs Task Force** and provide indispensable resources to those afflicted by troubling circumstances so that we can help those who need it most.

ISAPS: Why is the ISAPS Humanitarian Program so important, and how can ISAPS and its members work to increase awareness in this respect?

TIRYAKI: There are two reasons. The first is for **public benefit**. The importance of the ISAPS Humanitarian Program is highlighted by the urgent necessity of specialized medical intervention during disasters.

This is a truth I understood firsthand during the 1999 earthquake in Turkiye. As the Chief Resident at the

epicenter of the earthquake disaster, I witnessed firsthand that plastic surgeons, due to their extensive surgical skills, are **essential in providing critical care** - making us indispensable leaders in disaster response. Our extensive surgical training makes us vital in disaster management, positioned at the forefront to deliver critical care.

Second, the ISAPS Humanitarian Program is **very important for our own community** because there's a compelling need to reshape the public image of our profession. Despite extensive training in reconstructive surgery, including craniofacial and microsurgery, plastic surgeons are often narrowly perceived as aestheticians.

This is a profound misperception with significant implications. By actively engaging in humanitarian missions, we not only provide critical aid but also strive to correct this misunderstanding, elevating the public's awareness of our true scope of expertise to its rightful and deserved recognition. Therefore, I believe that active participation in humanitarian missions is crucial in realigning this public perception with the reality of our expertise and the breadth of our contributions to medicine and Society.

ISAPS: Can you share some of the missions you led in the past five years? How have they guided you as it pertains to your role as the ISAPS Chair of the Humanitarian Programs Task Force?

TIRYAKI: I have been deeply involved in disaster relief operations, especially in response to significant earthquakes in Turkiye. My role was proactive and

hands-on, involving the immediate mobilization of surgeons, setting up surgical facilities, and managing triage and essential plastic surgery procedures.

To me, it is a profound privilege to possess the skills and expertise that enable me to assist our fellow human beings in times of dire need. **This opportunity to serve is a gift.** I believe it is a gift to have the capability, knowledge, and experience to help our fellow men and women.

ISAPS: What is your vision for the development of the ISAPS Humanitarian Program over the next 1-2 years, and how will these be implemented?

TIRYAKI: Looking ahead, my vision for the next couple of years is to establish a comprehensive database of plastic surgeons engaged in humanitarian work globally. This will not only serve as a resource for coordination and support but also enhance the visibility of these missions, seeking industry backing to ensure their sustainability and growth.

ISAPS: How can ISAPS members get involved, and why is it important?

TIRYAKI: It is crucial for ISAPS members to be involved in these humanitarian efforts. We have

reached out to our community for information on ongoing missions and eagerly await their responses and feedback. This information is vital in expanding our database, **enabling us to rapidly mobilize surgeons in response to emergencies**. For those interested but not yet involved, I strongly encourage reaching out, as your expertise could be invaluable in a future crisis.

ISAPS: Can attendees anticipate a humanitarian aspect at the ISAPS World Congress in Cartagena?

TIRYAKI: At the upcoming ISAPS World Congress in Cartagena, attendees can indeed anticipate a significant focus on humanitarian work. We have organized a dedicated panel to spotlight surgeons who are at the forefront of humanitarian surgeries and missions. This will be a critical platform for learning and advocating the vital support these endeavors require, underpinning the overarching message that our skills as plastic surgeons have far-reaching implications beyond the operating room, touching lives when and where it matters most.



Treating Asymmetry In The Buttock Region And Hip Dips

Many patients express concerns about asymmetry in the buttock region and hip dips, which can range from minor cases that may go unnoticed to more pronounced asymmetries that can cause discomfort and embarrassment. These asymmetries can occur due to weight loss, post-liposuction surgeries, or hereditary factors. Addressing this issue can help restore symmetry and achieve a more harmonious aesthetic appearance.

Correcting such asymmetry can result in a better body shape with enhanced curves and bring balance to the entire physique.

Traditionally, surgical intervention through liposuction and fat grafting was the primary method for correcting these types of asymmetries. However, with recent advancements in hyaluronic acid (HA) fillers, non-surgical treatment options have become available, offering excellent outcomes that are safer, simpler, and more predictable. The use of HA fillers for buttock and hip contouring presents a minimally invasive alternative to surgical procedures, allowing for precise and effective correction of asymmetries without the risks and downtime associated with surgery. Moreover, the procedure is performed under local anesthesia and the results are immediate, whereas surgical intervention requires general anesthesia and longer downtime.

HA filler is injected in the designated areas to achieve an aesthetically pleasing outcome and rebalance the ratio and proportions of the body, leading to patient satisfaction and improved self-esteem. However, this modality requires a certain level of expertise and technical skills, along with a thorough understanding of the underlying anatomy.

As a plastic surgeon, I prefer to treat such patients using HA filler particularly HYAcorp MLF2 which is a highly cross-linked body filler with a large particle size ideal for volumizing areas with depressions and providing a long-lasting result. I use an 18-gauge cannula to introduce the product and due to the biphasic nature and the advanced thixotropic technology (ATT) of the HYAcorp MLF2, injecting the product is smooth, making this an easy and simple procedure for both the doctor and the patient. Additionally, ATT promotes a longer duration of the filler and immediately returns to its normal state when the pressure is removed.

Furthermore, every single patient can receive a treatment customized to his needs, based on the required volume, and shape he desires. Additionally, the results are reversible, as the filler responds very well to hyaluronidase enzyme, allowing the product to be dissolved if necessary.

Proper antiseptic conditions should be applied, and the skin should be disinfected appropriately with the prescribed antibiotic before the procedure. One of the most helpful tools during the injection of body fillers is the ultrasound, as it ensures safety by verifying the product's insertion level, which should strictly be in the subcutaneous plane and never intramuscularly. In my practice, I tend to treat most patients with asymmetrical hip dips while they are standing.

This approach helps ensure that the volume injected is the desired amount and maintains a good contour and balanced ratio on both sides. I use either the fanning injection technique or the linear retrograde injection method, depending on the patient's anatomy and needs. I usually use the two-plane injection technique, which consists of placing the filler in two distinct layers: the superficial subcutaneous and the deep subcutaneous. To confirm correct placement, I usually insert the cannula at a 90-degree angle and then tilt it to inject in the superficial plane. Subsequently, I reinsert the cannula to access the deeper layer and begin the injection. For the superficial layer, I advise using MLF1, while MLF2 is recommended for the deeper layer.

Several adverse effects should be considered with this filler treatment, including ecchymosis, swelling, infections, and hypersensitivity. These are not common but manageable and can be easily avoided with proper medical skills and expertise.

In conclusion, the use of non-surgical options like HA fillers to harmonize body contours and treat asymmetries is rapidly advancing and evolving. This approach is achieving refined and defined body silhouettes, resulting in satisfied patients.
