This year, our newly formatted Congress makes it quite literally, "Your Meeting, Your Program"! Our initial invited faculty of 60 presenters have been chosen as your "best-rated" speakers across our ISAPS events from the last two years. The rest of the program is being selected by a peerreview process from all submitted abstracts, so the program is being created by "you". Additionally, we will soon be releasing a joint **Patient Safety Statement of ISAPS and The Aesthetic Society**, concerning **fentanyl**. I want to especially acknowledge Dr. Mark Jewell for his hard work in this **ISAPS Patient Safety Statement** together with our ISAPS Patient Safety Committee, chaired by Dr. Montserrat Fontbona.

February 11, 2023, is **International Day of Women and Girls in Science**, and as leaders, we need to emulate the importance of having women figures filling key positions, especially in our specialty. It continues to be an inspiration **to see more and more societies having strong women influencers, and I look forward to what is still to come.**

Another recent project that we just wrapped up is our **Annual Global Survey**. The results show a 19.3% overall increase in procedures performed by plastic surgeons in 2021, with more than 12.8 million surgical, and 17.5 million non-surgical, procedures performed worldwide. You can <u>download the full report here</u>. I would like to thank all of you who were in action mode and provided us with the data needed to complete the survey. And a special thank you to Drs. Gianluca Campiglio and Fabian Cortiñas for their contributions. Remember, action mode is the way leaders live, so as ISAPS members, we must all take part together, to create things greater than ourselves.

I ask you to progress your action mode and to consider taking part in our <u>Fellowship Program</u>. This is a fantastic opportunity for you to lead and share your expertise with aspiring surgeons. It is open to all ISAPS members and is only a three-month commitment. It is your chance to help in the advancement of education, and training and provide hands-on experience. The deadline for 2024 is already approaching, so apply before May 1, 2023, to be considered.

I anticipate 2023 to be another successful year, especially as we all continue to work towards the continued advancement of our specialty, together as leaders in global aesthetics.

Meet the New Board Member



Interview with **Dr. Kai Kaye,** ISAPS Ethics Committee Chair

In our continued effort to introduce our newest Board Members, we are excited to announce our recently elected Board Member and ISAPS Ethics Committee Chair, Dr. Kai Kaye. The <u>Ethics Sub-Committee</u> was formed late last year in an ongoing effort to keep a focus on the importance of ethical practices in the aesthetic plastic surgery specialty. Dr. Kaye is joined by Drs. Argentina Vidrascu and Renato Saltz.

We invite you to learn about the 2023 initiatives for this new Sub-Committee and the role that ethics plays at ISAPS.

ISAPS: The ISAPS Ethics Sub-Committee was created just last year; what prompted the initiative to form this Committee, and what steps is ISAPS taking in carrying out ethics as a practice for our specialty?

Kaye: ISAPS has become, over the last decades, a much bigger and more diverse Society that deserves and requires to be organized in all important matters, and in a way that is effective, transparent, and fair to all members. I consider ethical principles and the way we interact with patients, other society members, and the public, to be very important matters for any medical society. So, I suggested to the Board to establish our own, dedicated Committee, so that we can better approach ethical issues or conflicts that are anticipated to arise in a scientific society like ISAPS.

ISAPS: How do ethics influence our specialty, and how do you see ISAPS' ideology as it pertains to ethics?

Kaye: We are representing a specialty that must master not only the medical aspects of a surgical profession and its ethical consequences but must also accommodate and hedge the ethical challenges that arise inherently from the commercial side of modern aesthetic surgery. More than that, our profession also leaves an important imprint on social values like the perception of beauty, perfection, and imperfection, and the way we see people in a new, digital, and visual society, where appearances become more and more important.

These challenges are becoming further intensified with the ongoing rise of aesthetic surgery worldwide, and we as ISAPS' leadership, feel that responding to those challenges is paramount since ethics should be a core value of any modern organization, especially for a medical society representing aesthetic surgery.

ISAPS: What does the role of Ethics Committee Chair mean to you, and what do you wish to achieve during your tenure?

Kaye: It has been a great honor to have been elected by our worldwide membership as the trustee for the 2022-24 Board of Directors, and my personal vision for this position is to make it more tangible for our members. The original meaning of trustee is guardian or keeper, so the goal during my tenure, as a priority, is to help our society better define, and then preserve our ethical core values.

Some recent events have taught us that our Code of Ethics in its current form maybe not be up to the challenges mentioned above, therefore the current Board considers it an urgent matter to adapt and renew our Code of Ethics accordingly. This important work is now nearly completed within our committee and will be presented to the Board at the next meeting for implementation.

ISAPS: From your perspective as a Board Member, what would you say is significant for 2023 when it comes to objectives needing to be met for ISAPS? And how does it relate to ethics?

Kaye: ISAPS is on its best way to further consolidate its position as a modern, transparent, and open society

of members through a thorough review of all relevant areas, and by creating policies and terms of reference that align with proven and modern principles of good governance. These principles include a modern Code of Ethics that provides guidance to the Society and its members and an effective Ethics Committee that can oversee it, I think these are key objectives for 2023.

ISAPS: The ISAPS Organizing Committee is already busy preparing for the ISAPS Olympiad Athens World Congress; what are you most looking forward to this year? What are the top three reasons to attend ISAPS events?

Kaye: I am very much looking forward to the Athens

Olympiad, as it is the first event of its kind. I think it will be very attractive for all our members to define the content of this scientific Olympiad, to showcase their presentation skills, and to forge a friendly competition with their peers.

To me, being part of ISAPS means, and surely to most of our members, much more than just belonging to a scientific society; it means making friends from all over the world, it means learning from people who love to teach and are sharing science with passion, it means gaining experience and more knowledge in the profession we all love, and the ISAPS events are the moment where all of this cumulates into a great experience.

Dr. Petros Christodoulou

The sheer spectrum of subjects covered in the programs, the number of participating, renowned surgeons, and the amount of knowledge shared are unparalleled. Our specialty provides many international congresses that are of very high quality, of course, no doubt about that, but I feel that the yearly ISAPS congresses are in a league of their own. I always return home from ISAPS congresses full of new knowledge, exciting ideas, and new friends.

ISAPS: What are you most looking forward to at the ISAPS Olympiad Athens World Congress 2023? What are your main areas of interest regarding the program, and why?

Christodoulou: I am a reconstructive microsurgeon, breast surgeon, facial surgeon; an all-encompassing plastic and aesthetic surgeon. Usually, my biggest issue during an ISAPS congress is having to prioritize which presentations to attend, because of the plethora of simultaneous ongoing lectures.

Christodoulou: I am a professional and being an ISAPS member reflects that on many levels. I try to stay on top of my game, and up-to-date with new knowledge and advancements in my field.
